Charles Franklin Starnes was called from earthly labor to heavenly reward on Tuesday, January 9, 2018, at his home in Columbia, South Carolina. Born June 21, 1935, in Gastonia, North Carolina, he was the eldest of two children born to the union of the late Prince and Ovella Easter Starnes. He was raised an only child, having lost his sister at an early age. Educated in the public schools of Gastonia, Charles was a graduate of Highland High School in the Class of 1953.

After attending NC A&T for two years, he moved to Brooklyn, NY, and was employed in various capacities. Among his many career iterations were stints as a watch factory worker, toll collector on the NY Thruway, mail carrier for the USPS, and finally as a bus driver for the NYC Transit Authority, which he maintained until his retirement.

After leaving New York in 1987, Charles and his wife moved to Columbia, South Carolina. He worked for several more years, even trying his hand at entrepreneurship, a trait he passed to his daughter, before eventually retiring a second time. He was then able to spend time with friends, taking up new hobbies such as golf and becoming active in his community and Gill Creek Baptist Church, where he was an ordained deacon and member of the Men's Choir.

Charles leaves to cherish precious memories his wife, Daisy Williams Starnes of Camden; two children: son Cazembe Bektemba of East Orange, New Jersey, and daughter Lori (Robert) Isom of Camden; three grandchildren: Shani, Jelani, and Omari Bektemba; and a host of other relatives and friends.

“ Hi I'm your cousin Cynthia, my Little Brother is John. Charles Franklin and our mother Carrie and John Mack, our dad, were close and kept in touch when they lived in New York. Though most of our visits were by phone and a few in person, we knew we were family. I remember him stopping to pick us up as we were walking home sometimes from downtown, Brooklyn. Though his route took us only part way home, I recalled how thoughtful the gesture was and how happy mother was to share and help us understand how we were related. My maternal grandmother, Lula Hull-Crawford and Emma Hull- Starnes, Charles' grandmother, were sisters. Cousin Mary and Cousin Geneva (Aunt Emma's daughters) were very dear to us too. I have fond memories of our frequent visits to Gastonia which included: My Little Brother John and my Mother's Sister, Aunt Mary Curtis.
